Eyes & Body	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Does not look at audience; depends completely on notes ● Constantly fidgets or slouches 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Makes some eye contact, but reads notes or slides most of the time ● Fidgets or slouches at times 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Has confident posture ● Maintains eye contact with audience; only glances at notes or slides
Voice	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Speaks too quietly or not clearly ● Does not speak appropriately (too informal, slang) 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Speaks loudly and clearly most of the time ● Speaks appropriately for the situation most of the time 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Speaks loudly and clearly ● Speaks appropriately for the situation, using formal English when appropriate and science/engineering vocabulary
Presentation Aids	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Does not use audio/visual aids or media ● Uses inappropriate or distracting audio/visual aids or media 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Uses audio/visual aids or media, but they distract from rather than add to presentation 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Uses well-produced audio/visual aids or media to enhance presentation
